Latinx Sound Cultures: Belonging, Resonance, and Amplifications. A cross-regional, comparative, and collaborative project that brings together Chicana and Latina scholars to create a working definition of the emerging field of Latinx Sound Culture Studies. We explore the affect of voice and sound in its various mediated iterations in popular culture including terrestrial and digital radio, border spaces, music, and television in their creative construction of Latinx political subjects and Latinidades. We listen for demographic trends, social and spatial mobility, and the novel ways of engagement with old and new media.
